

Where is Ocheeche?

Biographical sketches of Henry, Reason and George W. Luellen, of Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania, published in *Commemorative Biographical Record, Washington County, Pennsylvania*, J. H. Beers & Co., Chicago, 1893, p. 1327, have sent many a researcher scurrying to find the location of Henry Luellen's birthplace.

The sketch begins: "George W. Luellen is a grandson of Henry Luellen, who came from the banks of the Ocheeche River in 'Old Virginia,' to Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania, about 1783. . . . He was united in marriage with a Miss [Mary] Barnet, of Washington County. . . . (The entire sketch from *Commemorative Biographies* is reprinted on page 66.)

Researchers have done a commendable job in tracing Henry's descendants, but have encountered nothing but frustration in trying to locate Henry's parents and birthplace.

Since Henry Luellen's biographical sketch was in a book published in 1893, one would suspect that the expression "Old Virginia" meant in an area that did not eventually become West Virginia (1863). For areas that could have been "Virginia" in "olden times," see the box on page 67. "Old Virginia" also could mean an area in which borders were disputed, such as the Pennsylvania-Virginia border, the Maryland-Virginia border, the North Carolina-Virginia border, or perhaps North and South Carolina. "Old Virginia" also could mean an area in Virginia that was not "West" Virginia. We must be looking for a location that was "Virginia" at the time of Henry's birth.

Various researchers have given Henry a calculated birthdate of 1764, based upon the known ages of his children. This date can only be a rough

The Third Llewellyn National Reunion is but a memory—a good memory.

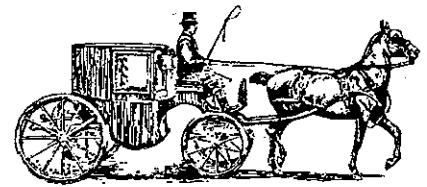
Although only 35 researchers gathered in Colorado at the Inn at Pueblo West for four days filled with research and congeniality, the 1989 reunion will be long remembered.

Beginning with registration on October 5 through our "Last Hurrah" Brunch on October 8, we renewed acquaintances, made new friends, and exchanged a wealth of genealogical information.

Attendance by descendants of Llewellyns who came from Wales to the United States in the 1830's helped put our early colonial research into perspective. Several cousins who had exchanged data over the years, descendants of Jacob Lewellen whose sons settled in Pike County, Missouri, met for the first time. Other cousins, descendants of Shadrach Lewelin, whose grandson Benjamin Lawellin settled in Anderson County, Kansas, also met for the first time. Such meetings become reunions in the true sense of the word. Once again, we made well over 2,000 copies of research data.

Discussion revealed that no one was able personally to make arrangements for our next reunion in Nashville, as planned, so Kansas City

guess. Henry's grandson, George Washington Luellen, was nearly 70 years old when the biography appeared in the Washington County history. He probably provided the information. Researchers have not found Henry's original land records from the period "about 1783." The first land record that seems to apply to this Henry was dated 1803, perhaps 20 years after Henry supposedly settled in Amwell Township. That land was located in Morris Township, and was bought from Naphlali Lindsly (*sic*) and was recorded in Vol. 1S, p. 30, of Washington County Land Records, 23 February 1803. Of course, the transaction could have taken place many years before it was recorded. Three other land deals were made five years later, all on 22 January 1808, two at Ten Mile [Creek or Village] by Henry Luallen (*sic*) (Vol. 1U, pages 103 and 104), and the third by Henry Lewellen (*sic*) in Amwell Township (Vol. 1U, p. 105). The fifth entry perhaps is the most significant since the grantor was "Francis

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Henry, Reason and George W. Luellen of Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania

George W. Luellen is a grandson of Henry Luellen, who came from the banks of the Ocheeche River in "Old Virginia," to Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania, about 1783 and locating on the farm now owned by Grant Moninger, took up 200 acres of land. He was united in marriage with a Miss Barnet, of Washington County, and to their union were born three sons and four daughters: Asa, Luellen (deceased), Mrs. Betsey Slusher (deceased), Jessie (deceased), Reason (deceased), Polly [Mary] (Mrs. Kearn) and Mrs. Millie Featherland (deceased). Mr. Luellen spent the rest of his life on the farm, and was successful in business.

Reason Luellen, son of Henry was born in 1795 on the old home farm in Amwell Township, this county, where he passed his life, receiving a limited education in the schools of the period. He was married to Sarah Pettit, who bore him the following children: Charles, George W., Jonathan, Bowen (deceased), Henry, and Andrew Jackson (the last named being deceased). The mother of these children dying, Mr. Luellen was united in marriage with a Miss [Sarah] Reynolds, and they

had two children: Sarah (Mrs. Riggle) and Simon who died in the army. Mr. Luellen devoted his life to farming and owned a good farm of 180 acres in Amwell Township, Washington County, also about three hundred and sixty acres in Iowa. He died on the old farm in 1858 in his 63rd year.

George W. Luellen was born in 1825 on the old homestead in Washington County and remained at home until 25 years of age, receiving a common-school education. In 1850 he was married to Miss Rebecca Thompson of Amwell Township, who has borne him four children: Mary Ann (Mrs. Closser), Margaret Ellen (Mrs. Russell), Allison (deceased) and Erma (Mrs. Swart). Mr. Luellen has a good farm of 150 acres in Amwell Township, and has been a busy and successful man. In politics he has always been a Democrat, and has held the office of road commissioner three terms, or nine years. Now 67 years of age, he is a strong, healthy man and has yet the promise of many useful and happy years to come.—*Commemorative Biographical Record, Washington County, Pennsylvania, J. H. Beers & Co., Chicago, 1893, p.1327.*

Lewellen ux" (wife).

We have not seen any of these original deeds and don't know if any provide clues to the birthplace or former residence of Henry Luellen (*sic*) or his relationship to "Francis Lewellen ux," which might indicate Henry's father or brother was a Francis Lewellen who was deceased by 1803, at the time Francis' widow, "ux," sold the land.

Reason, son of Henry, according to the biographical sketch, was born in 1795. Children listed in the sketch are in the same order as named in Henry's will (Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania, drawn 25 December 1819, registered in *Will Book 3*, pp. 319 and 320). Therefore, Reason was the fifth of seven children. Based upon Reason's birthdate, Henry Luellen and Mary Barnett "of Washington County" were married ca.1785 and all children were born in Washington County. Henry probably was about 21 when he married, giving him an estimated birthdate of 1764.

The late Joan Luellen, descendant of Henry and Mary Barnett Luellen, did extensive research on her Luellen line. Her sister, Frances Luellen Verdieck, of Grand Junction, Colorado, has shared Joan's research notes. We incorporate some of her research in the material that follows.

While to the best of our knowledge no "Ocheeche" has been located on old maps, gazetteers, or histories, there are several possibilities to consider. But first we suggest eliminating some areas.

George Washington Luellen, grandson of Henry, whom we surmise provided information for the quoted biographical sketch, seems to have been a life-long resident of Amwell Township. If "Ocheeche" had been a local place, the reference in the book probably would have read differently. At least "Old Virginia" would not have been inserted. We therefore rule out Washington County, Pennsylvania, and border areas that are in today's West Virginia.

Although several researchers have suggested that "Ocheeche" is another name for the Cheat River, coming out of the Cheat Mountains in Randolph County, (West) Virginia, to join the Monongahela River near Point Marion, Spring Hill Township, now Fayette County, Pennsylvania, nowhere have we encountered any name but Cheat for this river. A Washington County biographer would have been familiar with the Cheat and not used a remote name for it.

Joan Luellen wrote that she thought Henry Luellen might have been from the Tidewater area. She reasoned that Henry could have fled the area of his birth because of the American Revolution or because a terrible flood in the Tidewater in 1771 wiped out much good land. "About 15 miles from Richmond down the James River is an obelisk, referred to as the Randolph Monument which cites the calamitous year 1771 when all the Great Rivers of this Country were swept by inundations . . . which changed the face of Nature and left traces of their violence that will remain for ages." She felt Henry and his people must have used the term "banks of the Ocheeche" colloquially to designate a stream and an area with which they were quite familiar.

In 1630 settlement was encouraged on the southern side of the York River, "formerly known by ye Indyan name of Chiskiacke . . . Whereyupon houses were built at Chiskiacke, west of present Yorktown, and at York at the mouth of Wormeley's Creek." She felt it was quite possible that Ocheeche was a local name for the York River or for the James River.

Joan Luellen suggested that because the word "quechee" means gorge,

From *The Searcher*, newsletter of the Southern California Genealogical Society (February, 1986, p.36), comes this bit of interesting information:

Any reference to a person "born in Virginia" as early as 1728 or as late as 1863 *could* mean that he or she actually was born in:

- Illinois (if he or she was born between 1787 and 1818);
- Indiana (between 1787 and 1816);
- Kentucky (between 1775 and 1792);
- Missouri (between 1775 and 1792);
- Ohio (between 1778 and 1818);
- Pennsylvania (between 1752 and 1786);
- Tennessee (between 1760 and 1803);
- West Virginia (between 1769 and 1863).

Keep this in mind, especially, when confronted with birthplaces when reading censuses, as well as biographical sketches in county histories.

A reference to "Old Dominion" means Virginia.

Llewellyn place names

Llewellyn Run, Virginia

"Llewellyn Run is a 'left-hand' tributary of Pyles Fork of Buffalo Creek in Marion County, Virginia." We no longer have the reference that brought Llewellyn Run to our attention and would appreciate any information anyone has on this creek. Since our notes place it in Virginia it was known before the Civil War, because this stream actually is in that part of Virginia that became West Virginia in 1863. Llewellyn Run probably received its name from some of the Lewellyns we refer to as the "Monongalia County Lewellyns."

Lewellin Mills, Virginia

Lewellin Mills was a post office in Culpepper County, Virginia. It had a very brief life, being in existence for only about six years, from 1811 to 1817 (Reference to Lewellin Mills, Virginia, was found in the *Virginia Genealogist*, 8:1, January/March, 1964, p.65).

Louellen, Kentucky

Louellen is a village in Harlan County, Kentucky. It is listed in the U.S. Postal Service 1988 *National Five Digit Zip Code Directory*, page 872. The zip code of Louellen, Kentucky, is 40853. Does anyone know for whom Louellen was named?

Lewellyn, Texas

Lewellyn, Texas, is not found on present-day maps. It was listed as the residence of a John J. Lally, Civil War veteran of Company N, 6th West Virginia Infantry, who entered the Danville (Illinois) National Soldier's Home (for disabled veterans) in October or November, 1899, as number 932 of the home's residents.

John J. Lally was born in Pennsylvania. This information was on a list of Danville Soldiers' Home residents which appeared in the *Illinois State Genealogical Society Quarterly* XIX:1, Spring 1987, p.9. If any of our Texas readers knows where Lewellyn was located and for whom it was named, we'd like to know.

we might take that into consideration when searching for the "Ocheeche." She offered the possibility of rivers in Virginia and elsewhere that have "falls" or gorges, the Potomac being one; another the James which cut "Balcony Falls," a series of rapids upstream from Lynchburg. She wrote, "Because the James and the Potomac are the only streams offering possibilities of water transportation between Chesapeake Bay and the valleys beyond the range, plans were made for their utilization as early as 1772. . . ." She goes on to report on the falls of the James River: "In 1733, William Byrd II laid the foundation of two cities, Petersburg and Richmond. In 1742, when the population was 250, the General Assembly enacted that a parcel of land, at the falls of the James River be constituted a town. In 1769, William Byrd III laid out another parcel of his lands, on the north side of the James River at a place called Shoccoes (Schoccoes/Schocco), formerly known as Fort Charles and also as Byrd's Warehouse. The General Assembly passed an act in 1764 to extend navigation of the James River from Westham (7 miles) downward through the Falls. . . ." She points out that it was in this area, in the 1630-1660 period, that Daniel Luellin played a prominent part in commerce and legislative matters.

Likely "Ocheeche" derived from Indian usage. While we're not suggesting Vermont as a likely place for Henry Luellen's birth, consider Ottawaquechee, an Indian name common to the area around Woodstock, Vermont.

A stronger possibility would be near the Holston River, which runs from the Tennessee River at Knoxville through the northeastern corner of Tennessee into North Carolina. The Holston was a popular migration route between North Carolina and Tennessee. "Hogohegee" was an early Indian name for the Holston River. Could Hogohegee have become Ocheeche?

A stream known as the Conococheague runs south from Chambersburg in central Pennsylvania into Maryland, near Hagerstown, emptying into the Potomac. Could "Ocheeche" be a contracted form of Conococheague?

The Susquehanna Indians, traveling through the broad valley that rolls gently southward from the Blue Mountains of Pennsylvania to the Potomac, pronounced every syllable of the word "Co-no-co-cheague" when they built a huddle of log cabins at the junction of the little river with the big Potomac, and they called their settlement "Conogee," or "Conogogee," or "Connecochiag" and sometimes "Coneygochug." Could they not also have abbreviated the name of the stream and of their settlement to only "cheague," and then, perhaps, "Ocheeche."

Perhaps "Ocheeche" is on the Virginia-North Carolina border.

There, in Mecklenburg County, Virginia, and Vance County, North Carolina, is an area today known as Occaneechee State Park. The Occaneechi were a tribe of Sioux Indians, who lived near and on the largest, the middle, island in the Roanoke River, just above the confluence of the Staunton and the Dan, near the site of Clarksville, Mecklenburg County, Virginia. The Occaneechi were traders and theirs was the common language in both trade and religion over a wide area. Before 1700, the Occaneechi went to the Eno River, near what was to become Hillsboro, Orange County, North Carolina, leaving their name behind, to be used even today to define the area on the Virginia-North Carolina border, as a state park. The tribe also gave its name to a trail or trading path that extended southwest through North and South Carolina from around Petersburg, Virginia—the same Petersburg laid out by Byrd. This was the route taken in an attempt to establish a new trading area with Indians in

1673, when the trader James Needham and an illiterate boy, Gabriel Arthur, explored the southern Piedmont (Carolinas), reached the Yadkin River, and found a pass to the west through the Carolinian Blue Ridge, eventually coming to the French Broad River.

A letter to Joan Luellen in 1978 from the Virginia Department of Highways suggested that "the Ocheeche" was actually the Ochacheeche, the name of an encampment area of the Sioux Indians in Georgia. The Georgian Ochacheeche probably were the same Indians known as the Occaneechi of Mecklenburg County, Virginia.

Remote possibilities also might be any of the following places, the names of which could have been mistakenly spelled "Ocheeche:" Occee, Florida; Occee, Tennessee; Occoquan, Virginia; Ochapee, Florida; Ocoee, Tennessee; Occone, North Carolina; Oconee, Georgia; Oconee, Illinois; Oconee, South Carolina; and Ohatchee, Alabama—and even Tomochichi, Georgia, in the beautiful Tennessee River Valley.

Joan Luellen felt "the Ocheeche" could not have been the Ogeechee River in Georgia, which is south of and parallel to the Savannah River and drains into the Atlantic. In 1728 William Byrd II headed a commission that surveyed the Virginia-North Carolina line from the ocean about 240 miles inland, so there could have been no question about the southern border of Virginia then—therefore the term "Old Virginia" would not apply to this area in Georgia in 1764.

We must consider several other probabilities connected with the reference to "Ocheeche" in the Washington County, Pennsylvania, history: The name probably is spelled in the book just as the author heard it; perhaps it was recited by an Englishman who habitually dropped his "H's" and we are off base using an "O" as our principal clue. More than likely, neither the author nor the person he interviewed knew how the name actually was spelled.

Researchers will have to consider each of these possibilities, and probably many more, trace any and all Llewellyns or Flewellens found in early records of the places mentioned in this article, and pay special attention to allied names, such as Barnett and others who settled western Pennsylvania about 1780. Study of the Lewellens in Ohio County, Kentucky, shows the marriage of Martha Lewellen to Jacob Mills Barnett. Could this be the same Barnett family Henry Luellen married into?

Flewellyn place names

Flewellens, Florida

Flewellens, Florida, was a railroad station stop in Alachua County, Florida, near the village of Micanopy. Evidently Flewellens was named for a Flewellen family that lived at or near the stop. Flewellens served passengers and freight haulers of a small railroad known over the years by several different names, including the Gainesville & Gulf and the Tampa & Jacksonville.

The G&G (or the T&J) ran from just north of Gainesville to just east of Ocala in Marion County. There were no good roads at that time (about 1880) and nearly all travel to and from Gainesville was by railroad. Every few miles there were station stops, mostly small, some a little larger, which not only served passengers but also were points from which vegetables and other freight were hauled. As roads improved and cars and trucks became affordable, the railroad lost business and in the 1940's it was discontinued and the tracks were torn up and sold for scrap for the war effort. When the railroad disappeared, so did Flewellens.

We are grateful to Dean Flewellin of Aberdeen, South Dakota, and his father, Milton Whitney Flewellin, of Jacksonville, Florida, for sending material from their files on this station. No one seems to know the names of the family for whom Flewellens was named. Perhaps the 1880 census would tell us.

Dennis Lewellen of Solomon Rapids

The following biographical sketch is adapted from *The History of the State of Kansas*, A. T. Andreas, Chicago, 1883, p.1030, and from the 1880 U. S. Census of Kansas.

Dennis Lewellen, farmer, who resided in 1883 in Pittsburg Township, Mitchell County Kansas (P.O. Solomon Rapids), was born in Ohio, November 22, 1835, and with his parents went to Indiana and as a farmer lived there until the spring of 1864, when he moved to Iowa. In 1870 he settled in Mitchell County, Kansas, where he began growing sorghum. In 1883 he had under cultivation 35 acres which produced about 75 gallons of molasses to the acre. He had up-to-date equipment for producing "a very fine article of syrup." Dennis Lewellen married Sallie Porevo; they were the parents of eight children: Elizabeth, May E.,

Nelson, Harvey, Anna, John, Frank and Edward J.

In the 1880 census of Kansas, Dennis Lewellen, ae 48, was living in Turkey Creek Township, Mitchell County, with Sallie A., ae 41, his wife, and eight children. Daughters Pherlista E., ae 20; and Mary E., ae 18, were born in Indiana; and Annie, ae 10, was born in Iowa; the five sons were Nelson, ae 16, born in Indiana; Harvey, ae 14, born in Iowa; and John, ae 8; Frank ae 5; and Eddie, ae 1; all born in Kansas. Also in the household was 24-year-old John Moore, listed as "no relation, born in Iowa." According to this census, Dennis Lewellen was born in Ohio and Sallie, his wife, in Indiana.

(Editor's note: We have not been able to place this Dennis in any Ohio Lewellen family, although the name "Dennis" was carried by several men who descended from John and Catherine Eleanor Duvall Lewellen, of Preble County, Ohio.)

Continuing our series on Llewellyn traditions

"Traditions" is an attempt to connect distinct families that seem to have the same or similar family traditions. (Please see the introduction to this column in *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, Number 1, page 5.)

As this series continues, we shall see that similar traditions appear in widely scattered families. The first two traditions discussed in *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, Nos. 1 and 2, dealt with the same family (the Lewellens of Delaware County, Indiana), with the material coming from two different sources. Traditions 3 and 4 concern another family, Llewellyns in North Carolina, which does not seem to be connected with the Lewellens of Traditions 1 and 2, although the material in Traditions 3 and 4 sounds familiar, and is very similar to material we will discuss in Tradition 5 in our March 1990 issue, concerning yet another family.

Here then is still another version of a "three brothers" tradition, this one dealing again with the same family discussed in Tradition 3 (*Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, No. 3, pp.54-55.)

Tradition 4: The three brothers

"At a very early date, Chadrac (*sic*), Meshac and Abednego Llewellyn came to North Carolina from Wales. The last named died without heirs, as I am informed. Shadrac (*sic*) went to West Virginia or Pennsylvania and the only representative of his family I have found is the person of his great grandson Ex. Gov. [Lorenzo Dow] Llewellyn [Lewelling] of Kansas. Meshac's sons were Jesse (my great grandfather) and Alfred. Of Alfred's family the only representatives I can find are Thomas Llewellyn and family of Hillsboro,

Texas. My great grandfather, Jesse, died in North Carolina. My grandmother, Jemina [Llewellyn Bivens], was married in that state, and came to Tennessee in 1809 or thereabout. The three brothers, above named, were direct descendants of Griffith Llewellyn, a prince of Wales, who succeeded his uncle David III. . . ." (Statement made in 1912 by George Wythe Ewing, son of James Scott and Eliza Jane Bivens Ewing (b. ca.1829), and grandson of Nathaniel and Jemima Llewellyn Bivens, in *American Ewing and Ewin Families*, referred to in *Llewellyn, Lewallen, Lualin, etc., etc.*, Billie Harris, Sacramento, California, 1981, p.195.)

Please see In Pursuit of Tradition: 4, which follows.

We will continue the three brothers tradition with another account in the next issue of *Llewellyn Traces*.

In Pursuit of Tradition: 4

A comparison of Tradition 4 with Tradition 3 reveals agreement that one of a set of "three brothers" was the forebearer of the Jesse Llewellyn line, but there is disagreement between these two sketches about "Thomas," great grandson of an "original brother." Tradition 3 states that Isaac was Thomas's father; Tradition 4 states that Alfred was Thomas's father. Three possibilities come to mind: there was more than one Thomas; the name "Isaac" was used interchangeably with "Alfred;" or one (or both) of the sketches is incorrect. And for that matter, each of our suppositions could be correct or incorrect.

Tradition 4 deserves several comments: We can substantiate part of Mr. Ewing's statement. We know there was a Shadrach

Lewelin who probably was in Pennsylvania by 1750, and has been proved by Quaker records and county tax lists as having been in Loudoun County, Virginia, from about 1759 until 1782. In fact, this Shadrach was the editor's great, great, great grandfather.

There is tradition that there was a Meshach, supposedly contemporary with Shadrach, in North Carolina. We have seen no proof that this Meshach existed.

We know there was an Abednego; he arrived in Tennessee in July of 1783 (*Red River Settlers*, Edythe R. Whitley, GPC, 1980, p. 137); he was killed by Indians somewhere north of Nashville in 1787 or 1789 (*Annals of Tennessee*, John Ramsey, Nashville, p.484-85; and *Draper Manuscripts*, Lyman C. Draper, W, 30S, 243); and, according to deeds (Davidson County, Tennessee, Deed Book I, p.80), he left no heirs.

However, this Abednego seems to be a son of Shadrach, not a brother. Abednego left no will and between 1811 and 1813, almost 25 years after his death, three sons of Shadrach (Isaac, Meshach and Shadrach [Jr.]), signed quitclaims to property in Nashville owned by Abednego Llewellyn at the time of his death. The quitclaim deed signed by Shadrach, Jr., states that Abednego left no heirs. Had Abednego been a brother of Shadrach and of a "Meshach," and if Jesse, Isaac, Alfred, and Thomas were descendants of "Meshach" (or of the elder Shadrach), then they, too, should have been involved in Abednego's estate.

We can further pursue Tradition 4 by tracing "Ex. Gov. Llewellyn of Kansas" back to his great grandfather, William Lewelling of Randolph County, North Carolina—the same William who left the will in Randolph County in 1798 and

probated in 1799 (see *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, No. 3, p. 50.)

This William had, among his seven sons, two younger sons named Meshach and Shadrach. If the statement made in Tradition 4 is correct, William Lewelling must, too, have been a son of Shadrach Lewelin, who lived in Loudoun County, Virginia, ca.1757. Our Tradition 5 in the forthcoming *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 2, No. 1, March 1990, will deal with another three-brothers story, this one further identifying Shadrach Lewelin (above) as one of the "original three brothers."

Contemporary obituaries

Obituaries for the following Llewellyns were gleaned from contemporary sources. Some of the obituaries are very recent; others are a little less so. All were submitted by our readers, and we have abstracted each. Sources for each obituary follow the item.

Lewallen, Homer

Homer Lewallen died 26 April 1989 in Pleasant Valley, Clay County, Missouri, at the age of 86. Homer was born in Arkansas and had lived in the Kansas City area for about 40 years. He retired from Cook Paint & Varnish Company in 1967.

Survivors included a brother, Fred Lewallen, Seattle, Washington, and two sisters, Bertie Skelton, Kansas City, Missouri, and Ruby Gaw, Siloam Springs, Arkansas. Services were held in Berryville, Carroll County, Arkansas, and burial in Holmes Cemetery, Harrison, Boone County, Arkansas.—Information from the *Kansas City (Missouri) Star*, 28 April 1989.

Lewallen, Ida Emma

Ida Emma Lewallen of Eudora, Douglas County, Kansas, died 13 June 1982, in Eudora, at the age of 94. Mrs. Lewallen was born in Clayton, St. Louis County, Missouri, in 1888.

She was the widow of Oliver J. Lewallen, who died in 1974. Together they owned and operated the Lewallen Grocery and Confectionary at 18th Street and Walker Avenue in Kansas City, Kansas. Mrs. Lewallen had lived in Kansas City, Wyandotte County, Kansas, for more than 60 years, before moving to Eudora.

She was survived by a daughter, Colleen C. Farren, Kansas City, Kansas; four grandchildren, six great grandchildren and one great granddaughter. Burial was in Highland Park Cemetery, Kansas City.—Information from the *Kansas City (Missouri) Star*, 15 June, 1982.

Lewallen, John W.

John W. "Lew" Lewallen died 18 August 1989 in Kansas City, Missouri. John attended the first Llewellyn National Reunion in Kansas City in June, 1985. His lineage had been traced only to his grandfather, Thomas Warren Lewallen, who died in 1923 in Missouri.

John Lewallen was born in Tonganoxie, Leavenworth County, Kansas in 1920 and lived in Nowata, Oklahoma, before moving to the Platte County area of Kansas City in 1941.

He retired in 1978 after 33 years at the General Motors Fairfax assembly plant. He was a member of the Barry Christian Church and past master and member of the Rising Sun Masonic Lodge.

He was survived by his wife Nina Lewallen and a daughter Dollie Mae Lewallen, both of the home, and another daughter, Mary Susan Lewallen, Cookson Hills, Oklahoma; two brothers, Robert

Lewallen, Tacoma, Washington, and Richard Janes, Tulsa, Oklahoma, and a sister, Sylvia Schiern, Oceanside, California. Burial was in Chapel Hill Cemetery, Kansas City, Missouri.—Information from the *Kansas City (Missouri) Star*, 20 August 1989.

Lewallen, Kirk J.

Kirk J. Lewallen, of Carlsbad, California, died 1 July 1989 in Oceanside, California. He was born in 1946 in Dallas, Texas, and lived in Kansas City, Kansas, before moving to Carlsbad in late 1988. An Army veteran, he was a carpenter.

Mr. Lewallen was survived by his wife Glenda, of the home, and two sons, Ross Lewallen and Brock Lewallen of Plano, Texas, and by his mother, Margurite Shouse, of Gladstone, Missouri. Burial was at Eternal Hills Memorial Park Cemetery, Oceanside, San Diego County, California.—Information from the *Kansas City (Missouri) Star*, 11 July 1989, p. C-4.

Lewallen, Ruth H.

Ruth H. Lewallen, formerly of Kansas City, Missouri, died 30 August 1989 at her home in West Plains, Howell County, Missouri.

Mrs. Lewallen was born in Caldwell, Sumner County, Kansas, in 1907. She was a seamstress for the H. D. Lee Company in Kansas City and San Francisco, and upon retirement moved to West Plains. Survivors included a son, John A. Vutich, Sr., Gladstone, Missouri; three sisters, Lillian DeSchepper, Kansas City, Missouri; Mary Edwards, Warsaw, Missouri; and Clara Belle Parretta, Liberty, Missouri; a grandson; and three great grandchildren. Burial was in White Chapel Cemetery, Kansas City.—Information from the *Kansas City (Missouri) Star*, 1 September 1989.

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Lewellen, Joseph Elwood

Joseph Elwood Lewellen, age 77, of rural Cassoday, Butler County, Kansas, died 27 August 1989 at his home. Joe was a subscriber to *Llewellyn Traces*.

He was born 1 July 1912, in Butler County, Kansas, the son of R. T. and Susie Jane Parker Lewellen. He had never married.

A member of a pioneer Kansas family, Joe Lewellen lived his entire life in Chelsea Township, Butler County. His original home was displaced by the construction of El Dorado (Kansas) Lake. A cattleman, Joe raised prize-winning Herford stock; he was a member of the American Herford Association.

Survivors were his brother, Charles Doctor Lewellen, of Rossville, Kansas; and nephews and nieces, Sharon Lewellen Elder, Yates Center, Kansas; Charles Elwood "Woody" Lewellen, Madison, Kansas; Marion Arthur Lewellen, Ft. Gibson, Oklahoma; Linda Kay Lewellen Kelley, Rossville, Kansas; and Craig Glenn Lewellen, Broken Bow, Oklahoma.

Joseph Elwood Lewellen was a cousin of several *Llewellyn Traces* subscribers, including Leo C. Hullihan, Francis Henn, Helen Acosta, and Virginia Shuster.

Burial was in Sunset Lawns Cemetery, El Dorado, Kansas.—Information from the *El Dorado* (Kansas) *Times*, 30 August 1989, p. 3 and from the family notes of Leo C. Hullihan.

Luellen, Doris

Doris Luellen, a longtime officer in the U. S. Foreign Service, died 13 November 1989, in Tucson, Arizona, at the age of 76.

Ms. Luellen, who was born in Oklahoma and reared in Kansas, was graduated from the University of Southern California in 1934. She retired in 1970 as first secretary of

the U.S. Embassy to the Dominican Republic, as third-ranking diplomat. She had earned a meritorious award and several commendations from the State Department. During her career, her assignments included service in Stockholm, Athens, Paris, Rangoon, and Nairobi, as well as Santo Domingo.

Ms. Luellen, a member of the Tucson County Club and the Foreign Service Officers Club of Southern Arizona, resided in Tucson with a sister, Jette Lee, who also served with the Foreign Service and was Doris Luellen's only surviving relative. Ms. Luellen's ashes were interred in Rock Creek Cemetery, Washington, D.C.—Information from the *Arizona Daily Star*, Tucson, 15 November, 1989, Section B, p. 4.

Whitten, Helen Virginia
Lewellen Saylor

Helen Virginia Lewellen Saylor Whitten, age 70, a resident of Centralia, Boone County, Missouri, died 26 September 1988, in Columbia, Boone County, Missouri. Helen Virginia Lewellen was born 27 February 1918 in Curryville, Pike County, Missouri, the daughter of Dennis Bernard "Dennie" and Emma Mae Spegal Lewellen. She had two Lewellen lines in Missouri. From her great grandparents Napoleon B. Lewellen and Agnes Trabue Lewellen, second cousins who married in 1852, she descended (through her great grandfather Napoleon) from James and Mary Donald Wylie Lewellen and (through her great grandmother Agnes) from John White and Jane Trabue Lewellen. Her grandparents were John Hosea and Jennie Tolivar Lewellen, of Pike County, Missouri. In 1933, Helen Virginia Lewellen married Ralph L. Saylor in Ralls County, Missouri. In 1962, she married George L. Whitten, who survived

her.

Mrs. Whitten was a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Nursing, (Columbia). She was an avid historian and genealogist, and a member of DAR and other patriotic societies. She also was a member of the State of Missouri Historical Society, of Rebekah Lodge 430 of Louisiana, Missouri, and of the Missouri State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses.

In addition to her husband, survivors included a son, Ralph Saylor, Hallsville, Missouri; and four daughters, Carolyn Gruber, Columbia, Missouri; Frances Calvin, Irondale, Missouri, and Mary Hurt and Denise Llenk, both of Jefferson City, Missouri; three sisters, Margie Farmer and Viola Sullivan, both of Sacramento, California; and Ruth Conroy, Louisiana, Missouri; 13 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Burial was in Hawthorne Memorial Gardens, Jefferson City, Missouri.—Information from the *Columbia* (Missouri) *Daily Tribune*, 26 September 1988, and the *Vandalia* (Missouri) *Leader*, 29 September 1988, p. 3.

Hope Lewellen

Hope Lewellen of Orland Park, a suburb of Chicago, was critically injured when she was run over by the wheel of a taxiing airplane at O'Hare International Airport, according to an undated clipping from the *Chicago Tribune*, sent by a subscriber.

She had been directing a Scandinavian Airlines Boeing 767 jumbo jet. We have no knowledge of the outcome of this accident. Hope, ae 22 at the time of the accident, was admitted to Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, Illinois.

Probate of the estate of Robert L. and Elizabeth Flewwellin

Dean Flewwellin of Aberdeen, South Dakota, has sent us a wealth of information, most of it concerning Flewwellin and Flewwelling families, one branch of which was the subject of Query 24-89, *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, No. 1, March, 1989, p. 18. Included in the packet of papers, photocopies of documents and clippings, etc., was an invaluable probate record of the court of Westchester County, New York, concerning the disposition of property left by Robert L. and Elizabeth Flewwellin, of Westchester County.

On 16 March 1854, "said Robert L. Flewwellin, together with Elizabeth Flewwellin, his wife, made a certain deed of conveyance of said premises to the lineal descendants of Robert Flewwellin and Mary Flewwellin, parents of Isaiah Flewwellin and John Flewwellin, who are now living and all the heirs of whatsoever name of said Robert Flewwellin and Mary Flewwellin, his wife, deceased, of the second part, wherein and whereby he conveyed to them the said real estate above described*, which said deed was recorded in the office of the Registrar of the County of Westchester on the 16th day of March, 1854, Liber 262, page 255."

In 1897, the City of New York moved to acquire the said property, along with other property, for water supply purposes, and in 1908 the Commissioners of Appraisal (New York City) made "an award for said real estate in the sum of \$4,001.50, to the lineal descendants of Robert Flewwellin and Mary Flewwellin and all the heirs of whatsoever name of Robert Flewwellin and Mary Flewwellin, his wife, deceased, and thereafter and on about the 28th day of November, 1908, the award of said Commissioners for said property . . . Plot A, Parcel No. 105, was confirmed by an order of the Supreme Court, and that . . . on or about the 2nd day of April, 1908 . . . \$6,936.48 [was awarded into a trust] by reason of the persons entitled thereto not being designated by name in the award. . . ."

On 1 December 1909, a suit was brought by brothers Nathaniel B. and Oliver C. Flewwellin against all known heirs (descendants) of Robert L. and Elizabeth Flewwellin and asking the court to distribute the funds held in trust to those entitled to them. The brothers, Nathaniel B. and Oliver C. Flewwellin, were each owners in fee simple of an undivided interest (1/144th interest) in the property.

The suit includes the list, by family, of the 144 known descendants of Robert and Mary Flewwellin. These names will be included in the March, 1990, issue of *Llewellyn Traces*.

*The property was described as follows: "Beginning at the northeast corner of the hereinafter described lot of ground by a stake driven in the ground and a few feet south of a rail fence running in a westerly direction and a few rods north of Pine Bridge; thence southerly 7 rods to a stake set in the ground; thence westerly 7 rods to a stake set in the ground; thence northerly 7 rods to a stake set in the ground; thence easterly 7 rods to the place of Beginning." (Town of Yorktown, County of Westchester, State of New York.)

Moses Llewelyn of Bala, Kansas

Moses Llewelyn was born
Christmas day, 1822, perhaps in
Llangullin, North Wales, and
married first in Blanevan, South
Wales. After the death of his wife,
he emigrated to Pittsburgh,
Pennsylvania, where he met and
married Mrs. Jane Eleanor (Davis)
Lewis on 20 March 1872.

In 1873 they settled in the Welsh
community of Bala, Riley County,
Kansas, where they lived on a
farm. In 1880, they were forced to
move into town because they and
the Welsh Land and Immigration
Society of America, which had
purchased land from the Kansas
Pacific Railroad, could not meet
payments on the land. The entire
settlement reverted back to the
railroad. In 1882 they filed home-
stead intentions and, near their
original farm, bought land in
Madison Township, which is now
part of Fort Riley.

Moses and Jane Lewis Llewelyn
had 12 children, three dying in in-
fancy. The eldest child was 12 and
the youngest under 3 when Moses
died of pneumonia in July 1887.
Jane kept the family together and
later married Daniel D. Edwards.
Jane Llewelyn was born in October
1845 and died in April 1907. Both
she and Moses are buried in Bala
Cemetery, Riley County, Kansas,
as are several of their children.

66-89 Can you help me with my Flewellens? Fannie (Frances?) or Elizabeth Flewellen married John Gibson (1749-1829) and they lived in Warren County, Georgia. Fannie/Elizabeth died in 1807. Their daughter, Nancy, born in South Carolina about 1777, married John Gorman. I would like to know more about her ancestors and descendants. One source says Fannie/Elizabeth Flewellen Gibson was the daughter of Captain Abner Flewellen, but that cannot be correct because he was born in 1760. Was she his sister? Help!

(Note: Please see *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, No. 1, p.8 for mention of Frances Flewellen and John Gibson, Jr., regarding his service in

the American Revolution as a DAR Patriot.)

67-89 Need information about parents and siblings of James Lewellen (1820-1889) and his wife Susannah Wolfe. Tradition says they came from Virginia to Pennsylvania, and eventually moved to Kansas. James and Susannah married 1841 and had nine children, all born in Masontown, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. The children were Elizabeth Jane Lewellen, b.1842, m. Henry Inghram; Margaret A. Lewellen, b.1844, m. Isaiah Riffle; Jacob W. Lewellen, b. 1846, m. Catharine ?; Lewis C. Lewellen, b. 1846, m. Sarah E. Hague; John I. Lewellen, m. Elizabeth Burwell; James M.

Lewellen, m. Eva ?, then Ann Smith; David Wolfe Lewellen, b. 1859, m. Ella Mary Crow; Susannah Lewellen, b.1855, m. Josiah A. Bowman; Leroy W. Lewellen, b.1864, m. Dora Howard. Three of these children: Elizabeth Jane Inghram, Jacob W. (and wife Catharine), and James M. (and wife Eva) moved to Kansas, where, in 1905, they executed a deed to their brother, David Wolfe Lewellen. At the time they were in Harvey County, Kansas.

The father, James Lewellen, was a blacksmith. His wife, Susannah Wolfe Lewellen, died in 1871, and James subsequently married Mary M. Bowman, who died in 1882; he then married Elizabeth Tracy. Elizabeth survived James (1889) and moved with some of the family to near New Salem, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. Can you help me with this family?

68-89 What happened to Henry Luellen (and Sarah ?) born 1811 in Amwell Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania? Henry's father was Asa Luellen, mother Eunice Peck. We have no continued record of Henry's and Sarah's first son, Josephus, b. ca.1833 (1850 census). My great grandfather, Daniel, b. 1835, was Henry's second son. Wish any information on Josephus and/or his parents.

69-89 George Washington Lewellen was born in Tennessee about 1832. The 1860 Mississippi census lists him as "merchant," 28 years old, married to Martha Ann (Long) who was 18 years old, born in Mississippi. In their household was five-day-old Margaret. In the same household was Joel Lewellen, age 21, also born in Tennessee.

George Washington Lewellen, a captain in the Civil War, served with Nathan Forest, and was taken prisoner. He returned to Guntown,

Lee County, Mississippi, where he died soon after. George Washington and Martha Ann Long Lewellen had a second child, George Arthur Lewellen, born 30 May 1862, in Pontotoc County, Mississippi. Shortly after the death of her husband, Martha Ann Long Lewellen married again, to A. J. Cochran. She reared her daughter, Margaret, but the son, George Albert Lewellen, was reared by his father's sister, Alviria, who had married a Major Harold or Harrell.

George Arthur Lewellen married Lilla Belle Cayce 27 December 1887 in Guntown, Mississippi. They left Mississippi for Texas in 1909 to join the faculty of TCU at Waco. When TCU burned and was moved to Fort Worth, George Arthur and his family moved, too. He died in Fort Worth, Tarrant County, Texas, 4 January 1912. George Arthur Lewellen's family included 5 daughters and 6 sons. Any information about his father, George Washington Lewellen—parents, siblings, etc. would be greatly appreciated.

70-89 In *Llewellyn Traces*, Vol. 1, No. 2, p.31, John and Phillip Lewellen, of Preble County, Ohio, were listed as members of Lieut. Silas Fleming's Company (War of 1812). The roster of Fleming's Company printed on page 40, *History of Preble County, Ohio*, by E. C. Williams, lists Thomas and Phillip Lewellen as privates of the Third Regiment, Fifth Brigade, First Division of Ohio Militia, called 14 April 1812. These Lewellen men were sons of John (Sr.?) and Catherine Eleanor Duvall Lewellen and his will, proved 5 May 1827, in Preble County, Ohio, contains an orderly list of his children, naming Thomas "my eldest son," and Philip "my second son", etc. Son John L. (Lewis) was "my fourth son." John Lewis Lewellen would have been too young to have been

in the War of 1812. Was the information in *Ohio, Crossroads to the West* which listed "John" (Jr.?) incorrect?

71-89 Need information on Martha Lewellyn who married Robert Jones, Sr. Their daughter Margaret Jones married Christopher Garlington in 1690. They

lived in Northumberland County, Virginia, and had five children: Sarah, Christopher, Samuel, William and Frances (surname Garlington). Any help would be appreciated.

72-89 Am searching for information about my great great grandmother, Sara(h) Creely LuAllen



Do you know this couple? Could they be Isaac and Nancy Whitten Lawallin? Isaac Lawallin, born 1832, married Nancy Whitten in 1854 in Wayne County, Indiana. The photo was made by the G. W. Stewart photographic studio in Montpelier, Blackford County, Indiana, perhaps in the late 1880's. It was among unidentified photographs belonging to the late Ruth Babb Reynolds, granddaughter of Hannah Ann Lawellin and Samuel Babb, who married in Randolph County, Indiana, in 1843. Isaac Lawallin and his sister, Hannah Lawellin Babb, were children of Benjamin and Nancy Jane Sutton Lawellin, and great grandchildren of Shadrach and Deborah Burson Lewelin. Isaac remained in Indiana at the time his parents and most of his brothers and sisters migrated to Lee County, Iowa, in 1855, and then to Anderson County, Kansas, in 1857. Do you see a resemblance to any of your Llewellyn ancestors in this photograph?

Plumlee, who was born 1805 in Whitesboro, Tennessee, daughter of Biak LuAllen. She lived in Berryville, Arkansas, and then in Parker County, Texas. She died 1884 and was buried in Springtown, Parker County, Texas. (Note: Please see the reference to Berryville, Arkansas, in the obituary of Homer Lewallen, p. 73 of this issue.)

73-89 In the Williams County, Ohio, Grantee-Grantor Index, Sylvester, Simeon and David Lewallen are listed as buying property. Sylvester, "of Stark County, Ohio," purchased property in Madison Twp., Williams County, in 1847. Does anyone know if any of these men was related to my Sarah Llewellyn/Llewellen, b. ca.1818, m. Charles E. Cooney. Sarah died 1872 and is buried in Billington Cemetery, Williams County, Ohio. Would you please check your records.

74-89 Amelia "Amy" Lewellen was born 1802 in New Jersey and married William Henry Taylor 1822. Supposedly William and Amy Taylor purchased land belonging to Isaac Lewallen in Wells County, Indiana, ca.1850. Were they related to Isaac? Who was Amy's father?

75-89 I'm interested in the Llewellyn surname because it ties into my Clark line. Vinnie Clark, b. ca.1870, son of John Thomas Clark, of Duncan, Oklahoma, married a Lewellan/Lewellin. Do you suppose someone searching in Oklahoma has information for me? Also, some of these relatives ended up in Pueblo, Colorado. I live in British Columbia and have little access to Oklahoma and Colorado records! Can you help me?

76-89 Mary Jane Louallen/Lewallen was born 1837, in

Tennessee, and married Wiett Bilyeu sometime before their first daughter, Sarah Emiline, was born 1 January 1859 in Missouri. Mary Jane and Wiett seem to have had two other daughters, Polly, born 1859/60 and Hannah Elizabeth, b. 1861 in Christian County, Missouri. The mother Mary Jane Louallen Bilyeu died in the early 1860s. Other Bilyeus married Lewallens, too. Stephen Bilyeu married Elizabeth Lewallen 1868 in Christian County, Missouri; Martha Bilyeu married John Lewallen. Do you have any information on these families?

77-89 Need information on the two younger brothers of Harrison Green Lewelling—Jefferson Lewelling and James Meshach Lewelling—of Henry County, Indiana. Believe they lived with relatives after their mother died about 1857.

78-89 Hunting anything on Enoch Lewallen and Aaron Lewallen, sons of William and Hannah Lewallen. Were they related to Asa Lewallen who was in Bedford County, Virginia, in 1830?

79-89 Who was E. C. Lewellen? In a Western Kansas antique shop, subscriber Betty Reed of Dodge City, Kansas, found a deep maroon Eversharp pencil imprinted with "Wolf Milling Co., Ellinwood, Kansas, Wolf's Premium Flour; E. C. Lewellen, Salesman, Newton, Kansas." Ellinwood is in Barton County, Kansas, Newton in Harvey County. We'd judge the pencil is of 1930 vintage, perhaps later. Would like to place E. C. Lewellen.

80-89 Would like names, dates, marriages, etc. of the children and grandchildren of Margaret Lewellen (Lawallen, etc.) who married Isaac McNamee, 22 6 month 1786, Westland Monthly

Meeting, Washington County, Pennsylvania. My records list 12 children, very little else.

Replies

10-89 We now have pages 83, 84, and 86 containing the Lewelling lineage from Major Haywood L. Robertson's family history, *Colonial Roots*. Evidently these three pages (and perhaps the missing page 85) comprise all of the Llewellyn information included in this book (8 1/2 x 11, typescript, single-spaced, published, we believe, 1 October 1976, and updated 10 February 1980). We'd like to have page 85 as well as the title page. Major Robertson was one of the founding members of the patriotic society The Order of the Loyalists and Patriots of the American Revolution, on 18 September 1973. Although *Colonial Roots* was published after the founding of the patriotic society, perhaps the entire volume is housed with records of this patriotic society, perhaps in Washington, D.C. Major Robertson traced his lineage from William Lewelling (Llewellyn) whose will was dated 28 January 1751 and proved 16 April 1752, in Norfolk County, Virginia, and from Chloe Lewelling Grimes, the daughter of William and his wife Frances ?. References cited by Major Robertson were *In Memory of Miriam*, by Mrs. Edna Guilford Cook, 1974, Rocky Mount, North Carolina, and *Early Edgecombe Records*, Micajah Petway Chapter, NSDAR, 1941, Rocky Mount, North Carolina. These references are listed on page 84 of *Colonial Roots*; perhaps more references are given on the missing page 85.

15-89 Perhaps the following 1900 Census entry from Smith Township, Dade County, Missouri, pertains to a member of Peyton

24-89 The packet of Flewwellin information dealing with this Query was so voluminous that it will be used as several articles, the first of which is on page 75 of this issue.

49-89 Harrison Green Lewelling, son of Meshach Lewelling and his second wife, Margaret Williams Lewelling, of Henry County, Indiana, was 2 years old when his father died 30 November 1840. His mother died when Harrison was 19 (1857), and he lived for a time with his older half-brother, Henderson Lewelling, in Salem, Henry County, Iowa.

Harrison Green Lewelling died in 1936 at the age of 98 at High Hill, Missouri, where he had a farm. He had four children, Bertha Barnes, Mattie, Walter, and Edna Veale, and perhaps others. (Note: See also Query 77-89 in this issue.)

65-89 Found: David E. Llewellyn of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 4411 N. Miller Avenue
